Principal's Message

Students engaged in a range of master classes on the day mainly in practical areas, an experience they are usually are not exposed to until the reach high school. I would like to thank the organisers of the day, Mr Le Breton and Mr Borg for their hard work in organising the activities and all the teachers who participated to make the day a success.

Celebrating a Sense of Community!

Our school celebrated our first, and hopefully one of many, Community Breakfasts on 17 March. One of our school's priorities is to establish deeper ties with local schools, local businesses and support agencies. Another priority is to also celebrate the contribution our local community members make to our boys and to public education in general.



At Belmore we believe that our focus is learning, this shapes everything we do at our school. Our boys receive personalised learning experiences that cater for their needs, and even though the gap some of our boys start with is huge, they are able to exit high schools with skills that equally as good to any other students

in any other school. Of course this does not happen by itself, it happens, through sheer hard work. At Belmore, we recognise that the success our students reach is not a coincidence. Hence we do acknowledge the foundation and essential work that happens in primary school. Earlier this year, I shared our HSC successes with primary school colleagues, as we do believe that learning is a journey that starts in primary

school and continues through high school.

I am sure we instil attitudes of lifelong learning in our boys.

Additionally, at Belmore we acknowledge that the path of success is not always a straight line, most of the time it is far complex than that. We believe that without the partnerships we have formed with service providers, with service providers such as Fusion, Links to learning, Wise up, GWS giants, Police liaison officers through Campsie and Bankstown and malny many more, we wouldn't be able to get the boys to the level they get to by the time they finish school, without their support.

Universities play an important role in teacher preparation and enrichment. The STEM Teacher Enrichment Academy provides teachers with knowledge, skills, resources and support to make real change in their classroom teaching. It inspires teachers to pursue their interests in science, mathematics and information technology, and to pass on that inspiration to their students. In addition to STEM, the work that Kate Kealey continues to do with her pre-service teachers on cultural diversity and the realities and complexities of teaching in south western Sydney is admirable. It is certainly of great importance to our young teachers as they embark on the journey of education in a inclusive multicultural Australia.

Environmental sustainability is another great initiative of our school that creates a platform for learning and mentoring. We would like to thank Canterbury council and the mayor of Canterbury for their support of our school and our boys.

Campsie RSL supports a number of initiatives at our school the most important of which is the Elite football program. The program allows for team learning and leadership, mentoring and of course the opportunity for our boys to compete in a sport they love.

The event was well received by everyone who attended and the school received several congratulatory messages.

Maths/Art Faculty Profile Mathematics Faculty

In 2016 the Mathematics Staff consists of four Mathematics Teachers Mr Smith (Head Teacher), Ms Taoube, Mr Vass, Ms Lal as well as Ms Letsios (Visual Arts) and Mr Di Marzo (Music)

Currently we have students at HSC Level study all levels of Mathematics including General Mathematics, Mathematics (2 Unit), Extension 1 Mathematics(3 Unit) and Extension 2 Mathematics(4 Unit).

A new concept which we have initiated with Year 7 is STEM. It is a Project Based Approach to Mathematics developed in collaboration with Sydney University and in Maths STEM is being driven by the enthusiasm of Mr Vass. It endeavours to reach across the curriculum areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics with a view to enthusing students with the ultimate possibilities through such endeavours. Six teachers spent three days at Sydney University late last year gaining an understanding of the STEM.



7C is the group that is working on the project. These boys are working on all aspects of having a grandstand built near the mini soccer field at the back of the school. Every Friday 7C are working on different aspects of the grandstand as related to the field of Mathematics. So far, Year 7 have found the volume of different types of designs, worked out costings for different grades of concrete. They have also worked on delivery costs and other associated costs such as steel mesh and wages.



7C are very excited at the prospect of undertaking such a mammoth task and are under no illusion of the amount of work it entails. Although they are in year 7, the students have great vision and extremely good ideas regarding the project. They are working well together.

We have also had a visit from Stuart Palmer (Mathematics STEM co-ordinator Sydney University) who was pleased with the progress and direction the project has taken.

Welfare Report

Attendance

There is strong evidence that shows that student educational achievement is linked to high attendance rates at school, so please ensure that your child's attendance stays above 85%. Welfare Programs

It has been a very busy and exciting time for the students so far, and as a school we have been proud to see our students gain scholarships and awards and be involved in many beneficial programs to enhance learning and contribute to their social wellbeing.

Anti-bullying Workshops

Our Year 7 and 8 have begun the anti-bullying workshops with their year groups and will continue to do so throughout Terms 1 and 2.

Together for Humanity

Every Monday for one period, Year 7 students have attended the 'Together for Humanity' workshops. Together for Humanity is a multi-faith organisation that helps schools and communities respond effectively to differences of culture and belief. The sessions will continue to attend till the end of Term 2

Wise Up

A select group of Year 9 students have been attending the Wise Up program. This program is run by Campsie Police, in collaboration with the GWS Giants AFL team, Canterbury district SES and Bankstown PCYC. During this 5



week program students are taken through a number of workshops week by week, and are taught leadership and goal setting skills, basic first aid, CPR and emergency rescue skills.

Students are also led through discussions surrounding issues they may face in life and taught the skills to deal with them. Although the topics are serious the activities are led in a fun and enjoyable manner and the boys look forward to the day each week.

Links to Learning

Another select group of Year 9 boys are also involved in our links to Learning program. This program involves engaging boys in activities that teach them important skills such as teamwork and goal setting through roleplay and games. At the end of the group sessions students have a one on one mentoring sessions with the facilitators to set down their own goals for school and life.

International Women's Day

During International Women's week the school held an assembly led by the SRC and attended by community members, as part of our commitment to White Ribbon Day. Female guest speakers addressed the boys about the importance of women in their life and the ongoing inequalities faced by women. The assembly ended with students acknowledging the female staff at the school and presenting them with flowers.

PACFest

Our Pacific Islander (PI) students have already begun preparations for the PACFest festival which is held at the end of Term 2. Students from Year 7 through to Year 12 prepare songs and dances from the different Pacific Island nations. This is a student led activity with all songs and dances organised and prepared by the students, and practice for the festival also done during recess, lunch and after school. It takes great commitment and initiative from the boys and the outcome is truly outstanding. Last year the boys won the 'Audience Favourite' award so they are very excited to be part of the festival again this year.

Pacific Achievement To Higher Education (PATHE)



The PATHE program facilitated by Western Sydney University (WSU) is also up and running. This program uses PI mentors, who have gone on to attend university, to facilitate workshops to

help encourage PI students to aim for higher education. Year 11 and 12 PI students attended the first session but all PI students will attend sessions throughout the year.

Fast Forward at Western Sydney University (WSU)

A select number of Year 12 students participated in the Fast Forward program at WSU which provided them with a taste of university life by engaging them in workshops in the area of study that interests them. Thank you to Ms Halaoui for attending this day and engaging the boys in the activities.

What should a safe learner look like?

Stay seated unless given permission, put your hand up!

Focus on your learning and ask for help if you need it.

Use any equipment with care.
What could be the consequences?
In the workshop/labs
In the computer room
In the gym
In the library



Bring the correct equipment to all lessons. In classrooms and

workshops/labs all students on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday **must** wear leather black shoes as part of the Department of Education's safety rules

On Wednesday Sport students are required to wear sport shoes for the whole day. Students must change into their sport wear (uniform and sport shoes) only for their PE lessons.



Strategies to support a Safe Learner

Make sensible choices and take responsibility for your actions. Think before you act.

Use positive by-stander behaviour. If you see someone who needs help assist using common sense

Tell the teacher if you need help.

Be responsible and safe: 'BIN IT'

Make the school a cleaner place. Whether you are in the classroom or out in the playground always remember to **BIN IT**

It is important to have a clean environment!

Be safe by:

Crossing at the lights

Not Jaywalking -- Jaywalking means crossing a road unlawfully or without regard for approaching traffic. Example-

- Crossing at traffic lights when red pedestrian light is indicated.
- Crossing a road diagonally.
- Failing to use a pedestrian crossing that is within 20 metres of your location

If your son comes to school on a bike, scooter or skateboard they need to WEAR A HELMET

Reasons for wearing a bike helmet

- 88% of all cyclist brain injuries could be avoided.
- A bad head injury can affect the rest of your life.
- It can help make you more visible to motorists and pedestrians.
- You won't have to listen to someone say "You should have been wearing a helmet" when you wake up in hospital.
- For weather protection- sun, rain, hail.

New cycling laws introduced on Tuesday, 1st March 2016

Increased fines for bike riders

- Running a red light / Riding dangerously / Not stopping at pedestrian crossing / Holding onto a moving vehicle - \$425
 - Not wearing a helmet \$319
- Riding without a working warning device (e.g. bell or horn) \$106
